

Member recruitment ideas

The school year is about to begin once more and it will soon be time to start recruiting members to join your Key Club to increase numbers. Here are a few tips on how you can achieve that.

Plan a meet and greet - Some of the students at your school might know of Key Club but not know exactly what it is about. So, you should set up a day where you and some of your fellow key clubbers set up a booth or even walk around letting potential members know more about Key Club

Social Media – An active social media presence is vital if you want your club to be recognised. Take advantage of club's social medias to post about upcoming events so that others can see and want to join in the fun, the more publicity the better! Recruitment posters are also a good way to get the message out.

I don't exactly have a name for this last one but you can also plan a service project in which anyone can come out and help which can be posted on your various social medias. At the end ask guests for their names and numbers so you can reach out to them with more information on key club and even offer a personal invitation to the meetings.

How to pay District and International dues

Key Clubs, in good standing, can use the [Membership Update Center](#) to add new members and update records after officer elections. The Key Club's Kiwanis or faculty advisor should update the club officers at the [Membership Update Center](#) after officer elections. Then, the club secretary can follow these steps to update membership and club information.

1. Round up information from each new member, including email addresses and expected year of graduation.
2. Log in and update membership records in the [Membership Update Center](#). You are only adding new members during this time. Do not graduate or remove any member on your club's roster. Graduation and deletions will be completed in September.
3. Submit payment or print invoice and pay by check. Clubs in good standing have paid their international member dues and district dues for 2016-17

Dues Deadline: December 1st.


The prices for this year have not yet been confirmed. However, do look out for them in a future newsletter.

Key Club Youth Opportunites Fund Recap



The Key Club Youth Opportunity Fund or the Y.O.F as its most commonly called is an endowed fund for Key Club International held within the Kiwanis International Foundation.

- ❖ September 1st 2018 - YOF applications available
- ❖ The YOF gives out grants only to Key Clubs and/or individual club members. However, there is only one opportunity to receive funds from the YOF each year.
- ❖ Clubs may request US\$100 – US\$2000. The committee typically funds clubs that are asking for a portion of the total cost and that are working with other organizations to help with funding.
- ❖ Applications must be received by **October 15th at 11:59 EST** using the current grant application keyclub.org/yof. Application Guidelines can be found in the Key Cub Guidebook Under “Board Policies”.
- ❖ The YOF committee reviews applications in November and Funding Notifications are sent out first week of January.
